PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: <u>A Legacy for Users</u>

On August 10, 2005, the President signed into law the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). SAFETEA-LU continues a strong fundamental core formula program emphasis coupled with targeted investment, featuring Safety, Equity, Innovative Finance, Congestion Relief, Mobility and Productivity, Efficiency, Environmental Stewardship, and Environmental Streamlining.

The Job Access & Reverse Commute (JARC) and New Freedom (NF) Programs are authorized under the provisions set forth in SAFETEA-LU. These provisions authorize the U.S. Secretary of Transportation to apportion funds to each state for grants to these programs. SAFETEA-LU also includes new planning requirements for the JARC and NF Programs, requiring that projects funded through these programs "must be derived from a locally developed, coordinated public transit-human services transportation plan".

The Governor of California has designated the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) Division of Mass Transportation (DMT) as the recipient of all Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5316 JARC and 5317 NF grants for the purpose of administering those funds in accordance to state and federal laws, statutes, and regulations. Caltrans DMT only administers Section 5316 JARC and Section 5317 NF funds allocated to small urbanized areas (50,000 – 200,000 population) and non-urbanized areas (<50,000 population). Large urban area (> 200,000 population) JARC/NF funds are administered by other agencies. FTA SECTION 5316 JARC PROGRAM GOALS

The JARC program goal is to improve access to transportation services to employment and employment related activities for welfare recipients and eligible low-income individuals and to transport residents of urbanized areas and non-urbanized areas to suburban employment opportunities. Toward this goal, FTA provides financial assistance for transportation services planned, designed, and carried out to meet the transportation needs of eligible low-income individuals in all areas. Another goal is to implement coordination of Federally assisted programs and services in order to make the most efficient use of federal resources.

FTA SECTION 5317 NF PROGRAM GOALS

The NF program goal is to provide new public transportation services to overcome existing barriers facing Americans with disabilities seeking integration into the workforce and full participation into society. Lack of adequate transportation is a primary barrier to work for individuals with disabilities. NF also seeks to expand the transportation mobility options available to persons with disabilities beyond requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101, et seq.). The definition of "new service" is any service or activity that was not implemented or operational before August 10, 2005.

GRANT APPLICATION PROCEDURES

A. Eligible Applicants:

Applicants may include state or local governmental bodies, Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs), social services agencies, tribal governments, private and public transportation operators, and non-profit organizations.

B. Eligible Use of Program Funds:

SAFETEA-LU requires that all JARC and NF projects selected for funding must be derived from a locally developed Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan). The Coordinated Plan identifies existing services, needs, strategies and priorities for low-income individuals, individuals with disabilities and older adults. (Please see Page 7 of this Application.)

C. Eligible Activities for JARC and NF Projects:

Eligible JARC/NF projects may request up to three years of funding per project. Projects approved for multiyear funding will require yearly application updates to ensure compliance with the original approved project scope. Funding commitments in the second and third year are not guaranteed, but will be granted pending the level of federal appropriations to Caltrans DMT. Eligible JARC projects include, but are not limited to:

JARC Operating Activities

- Late night and weekend service
- Guaranteed ride home service
- Shuttle service
- Expanded fixed-route public transit routes
- Demand-responsive service
- Ridesharing and carpooling activities
- Voucher programs

JARC Capital Activities

- Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS)
- Promotion of operating activities
- Vehicles
- Mobility management activities

NF funds are available for capital and operating expenses that support new public transportation services beyond those required by the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and new public transportation alternatives beyond those required by the ADA designed to assist individuals with disabilities with accessing transportation services, including transportation to and from jobs and employment support services. The definition of "new service" is any service or activity that was not implemented or operational before August 10, 2005. Eligible activities include, but are not limited to:

NF Operating Activities

- Expansion of paratransit service beyond the minimum requirements of ADA
- Expansion of hours for paratransit service
- Enhancement of services
- Voucher programs
- Volunteer driver programs

NF Capital Activities

- Acquisition of accessibility equipment beyond ADA requirements
- Purchasing accessible vehicles to support taxi, vanpooling, and/or ridesharing programs*
- Mobility management activities

^{*}Due to limited funding, vehicle purchases should refer to the Elderly & Disabled Specialized Transit Program (FTA Section 5310) and/or Large Urban NF Programs.

GRANT APPLICATION PROCEDURES

SAFETEA-LU allows projects considered as "mobility management" eligible as a capital expense under the JARC and New Freedom Programs. "Supporting new mobility management and coordination programs among public transportation providers and other human service agencies providing transportation" is specifically referenced as an eligible project in the FTA guidance. D. JARC/NF Performance Measures

The following indicators will be used to measure project effectiveness.

1. JARC Program

- □ Actual or estimated number of jobs that can be accessed as a result of geographic temporal coverage of JARC projects implemented on the current reported year
- Actual or estimated number of rides (as measured by one-way trips) provided as a result of the JARC projects implemented in the current reporting year.

2. NF Program

- □ Increase or enhancements related to geographic coverage, service quality and or service times that impact availability of transportation services for individuals with disabilities as a result of the New Freedom projects implemented in the current reporting year.
- Additions or changes to environmental infrastructure (e.g. transportation facilities, side walks, etc), technology, and vehicles that impact availabilities of transportation services as a result of the New Freedom projects implemented in the current reporting year.
- Actual or estimated number of rides (measured by one-way trips) provided for individuals with disabilities as a result of the New Freedom projects implemented in the current reporting year.

F. Cost Sharing/Match Requirement:

Funds can be used to support up to 80 percent (80/20 match) capital projects, and not more than 50 percent (50/50 match) of projects for operating assistance. The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) program funds cannot be used as a source of local match for other FTA programs, even when used to contract for service. However, some examples of allowable sources for local match monies for JARC and/or NF Programs operating assistance are dedicated tax revenues, private donations, revenue from human service contracts, and net income generated from advertising and concessions. Matching share requirements are flexible to encourage coordination with other federal programs that may provide transportation, such as Health and Human Services or Agriculture. Volunteer services or other in-kind contributions are examples of non-cash share. These contributions are eligible to be counted toward the local match as long as the value of each is documented and supported, represents a cost that would otherwise be eligible under the program, and is included in the net project cost in the project budget. In either case, the cost of providing the contract service is included in the total project cost.

GRANT APPLICATION PROCEDURES

G. Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for Small-Urbanized Areas Only

Upon request, Caltrans DMT will delegate the competitive project selection process to local agencies with small-urbanized areas for the JARC/NF grant programs. A small-urbanized area's population size is between 50,000 and 200,000. A non-urbanized (rural) area is 50,000 population or less. (See Page 16 of this Application for Small Urbanized Area Contacts.)

Local agencies that have entered into a MOU with Caltrans DMT will conduct the competitive selection process for the small-urbanized area(s) within their jurisdiction. This MOU selection process will be a "first-level" review and scoring of the JARC/NF grant applications before they are forwarded to Caltrans DMT for final review. (Selected projects must still be derived from the locally developed coordinated plan and meet the intent of the JARC and NF grant programs.) The local agency will verify that each applicant meets all the federal requirements of each grant program. The local agency is the primary contact for the first level review prior to submission to Caltrans DMT. (See Page 16 of this Application for Small Urbanized Areas and Contacts.)

If the local agency for your area is conducting the regional first-level review, your application will be mailed directly to that local agency and must be submitted no later than June 2, 2008. After the local agency conducts the first level review and scoring of the project application, they will forward them to Caltrans DMT for final review and scoring verification for a statewide competitive ranking. If a non-MOU local agency for your area is not conducting the first-level review, your application will be mailed directly to DMT and must arrive no later than **August 29, 2008**.

H. Statewide Project Selection Process:

For non-urban (rural) areas and small-urban areas not participating with MOU local agencies, projects will be awarded through a statewide competitive selection process conducted by Caltrans DMT. Project applications will be evaluated for all JARC and NF project applications in accordance with the scoring criteria to determine the extent to which the proposed project meets the overall program goals and objectives of the programs. DMT will establish an application review committee, which will be comprised of staff from non-applicant agencies, such as health and human services agencies, RTPAs and/or MPOs, consolidated transportation services agencies (CTSAs), transit agencies and social services agencies, to review, score and rank the project applications. Caltrans DMT will conduct the entire JARC/NF competitive selection process for non-MOU small-urbanized areas and all rural (non-urban) areas.

APPLICANT PROFILE AND PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The purpose of the City of Lompoc is to provide transit service that meets the needs of those that are transportation disadvantaged, while helping to reduce traffic congestion and assist air quality attainment. The system will offer a convenient, safe, and reliable transit service and an attractive alternative to the private automobile. It will contribute to the economic well being of the City and County by improving access to employment, shopping, medical, educational, and recreational destinations.

Briefly provide a project summary description. Include begin and end dates.

This project is intended to provide a transit link between the Cities of Lompoc, Buellton and Solvang, offering low-income populations opportunities for job access in Lompoc, Buellton and Solvang. The service start date is projected to be July 2008, with the pilot period ending in June of 2011. The service would also provide connections to Lompoc Transit, Santa Ynez Valley Transit and the Breeze service connecting Lompoc and Santa Maria thereby enhancing the cost and service efficiency of those other federally funded projects.

The SBCAG Board identified this service in May 2007 to be an unmet need, reasonable to meet. The specific requests for this service were for employment, medical and social service trips.

Briefly describe the <u>current</u> population and geographic area(s) that is served and the population and geographic area(s) that will be served by this project. <u>Supporting documentation and an</u> 8-1/2 x 11 map of the service area must be attached.

The current population of the three cities, according to the 2000 census is approximately 52,173. The population of the three communities is largely made up of White and Hispanic races with approximately 6,492 persons being identified as low income, and transit dependent. This service will assist low-income populations by providing additional access to employment opportunities in Lompoc, Buellton and Solvang.



The coordination of this service with Santa Ynez Valley Transit and with the Breeze service provides for increased efficient use of federal resources.

This project addresses past request for transit service between Lompoc and the cities of Buellton and Solvang, noted on pages 36 and 37 of the Coordinated Plan. It also addresses the need, identified on page 40 of the Coordinated Plan, for expansion of interregional transit services.

The major part of the route will run on Hwy 246 between Lompoc and Solvang. The schedule will provide three round trips a day in the morning, midday and late afternoon with each round trip being about 1 hour in duration. Projected rider ship for the first year is anticipated to be 4,700. The service will be operated by the City of Lompoc and its contractor, AmericanStar Transportation. The City of Lompoc will maintain the bus, to be utilitized in this service, with its current staff. Marketing strategies will be handled by the City of Lompoc and its consultant Moore and Associates. Marketing will include advertisements in local newspapers, and printed materials distributed to various outlets in each of the cities to be served as well as flyers on both City of Lompoc Transit (COLT) and Santa Ynez Valley Transit (SYVT).
