AGENDA ITEM NO. 2

A request by John Dugas, the property owner, for Planning Commission review and consideration of a proposal to subdivide an approximately 17,152 square-foot parcel of land into two (2) parcels. The property is located in the Medium Density Residential (R-2) Zoning District at 521 South I Street (Assessor Parcel Number: 91-203-22). A Negative Declaration has been prepared pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

BACKGROUND:

1920 –	Two two-bedroom	houses totaling	1,152 square feet were

constructed on the northern portion of the site.

1993 – A 3,680 square-foot duplex was constructed on the southern

portion of the site.

2004 – Conditional Use Permit 04-06 issued permitting the demolition

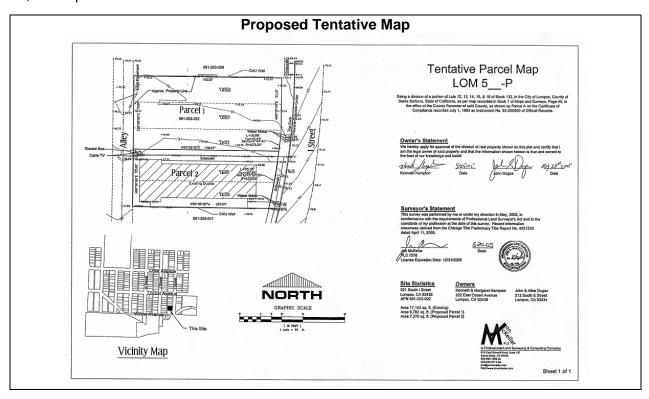
of the existing two-bedroom homes and allowing a triplex to be constructed in a Medium Density Residential (R-2) zone.

AUTHORITY:

The Planning Commission has the authority to approve, conditionally approve, or deny a Tentative Parcel Map (Lompoc City Code Section 2846). Once approved, the Tentative Parcel Map expires twenty-four months from the date of approval unless the applicant requests a time extension prior to the expiration. A condition of approval is included to advise the applicant of the map expiration date (COA P4). Government Code Section 65402 and LCC Section 2812 require a finding as to conformity of the proposed division with the General Plan which is included as part of the Commission action on this Parcel Map.

PROPOSAL:

The current proposal is to subdivide the existing 17,152 square-foot parcel to form two new distinct residential parcels. Parcel One (1) will be 9,782 square feet in size and contain the new triplex approved by CUP 04-06. Parcel Two (2) will contain the existing duplex and be 7,370 square-feet in size.



CONFORMANCE WITH GENERAL PLAN:

The General Plan designation for this property is Medium Density Residential and the stated purpose is:

To provide residential areas which are in close proximity to schools, shopping and other services; and which are at densities that are responsive to the economic considerations of developing affordable ownership housing and rental housing at various price levels. This category provides a buffer between lower density detached-housing areas, higher density multiple-family areas, and commercial areas.

The purpose of the proposed parcel map is to subdivide the property for future development by creating two new residential lots. As conditioned, Parcel Map LOM 548-P will be in conformance with the General Plan.

CONFORMANCE WITH ZONING ORDINANCE:

The zoning for this site is Medium Density Residential (R-2). The purpose of this zone is to stabilize and maintain the residential character of the district and permit a suitable environment for family living on a smaller scale by permitting a higher density with two families to the lot while maintaining individual privacy, open space and facilities.

The purpose of the proposed parcel map is to subdivide the property for future development by creating two residential lots.

Based upon the information provided and the conditions of approval imposed upon the project, Parcel Map LOM 548-P will be in conformance with the Zoning Ordinance.

CONFORMANCE WITH SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE:

Section 2844 of the Subdivision Ordinance requires Subdivision Review Board (SRB) review of Tentative Parcel Maps for conformance with the criteria listed in the Ordinance. The SRB is required to report its findings to the Planning Commission.

A Subdivision Review Board (SRB) meeting was held to review the Tentative Parcel Map on June 13, 2005. The applicant met with staff to discuss the proposal and draft Conditions of Approval for the Tentative Parcel Map were formulated. The following project specific comments were received:

Building Division

B1. Utilities such as sewer, water, gas and electric shall be located in accordance with California Building Codes. Each such utility shall not encroach on another parcel unless otherwise approved by the Building Department.

The Subdivision Review Board (SRB) has developed a series of standard conditions of approval (COA) to advise applicants of possible requirements during the development review process. Project specific conditions are included when staff can determine what they should be from the plans provided for Commission review. A complete plan check occurs after plans have been submitted to the Engineering Division for review. Please note that not all COA included with the Planning Commission Resolution for the project may be applicable. If the applicant has questions and/or concerns regarding specific conditions, he/she should contact the department/division that is recommending the condition. SRB members do not attend the Commission meeting and Planning staff cannot answer specific questions regarding conditions recommended by other departments/divisions.

In accordance with Section 2844 of the Lompoc City Code, the SRB recommends that the Planning Commission approve the proposed Tentative Parcel Map with the attached Conditions of Approval.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

An Initial Environmental Study has been performed for the proposed use. Pursuant to the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) a Negative Declaration has been prepared. It is recommended that the Commission review the document and certify the Negative Declaration for the proposal. A Notice of Determination will be filed following the Planning Commission action.

NOTICE:

Notice of Public Hearing was published in the Lompoc Record on June 17, 2005 and all property owners of record within 300 feet of the subject property were notified by U.S. Mail on July 1, 2005.

APPEAL RIGHTS:

Any person has the right to appeal the Planning Commission action to the City Council within ten days of the action. Contact a Planning Division staff member for the required appeal form. The fee for appeal is \$35.10.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Planning Commission:

- 1. Review the draft Initial Study and certify the Negative Declaration; and
- 2. Adopt Resolution No. 420 (05) approving LOM 548-P, a Tentative Parcel Map, based upon the Findings of Fact in the Resolution and subject to the attached draft Conditions of Approval.

RESOLUTION NO. 420 (05)

A RESOLUTION OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LOMPOC APPROVING A TENTATIVE PARCEL MAP TO SUBDIVIDE A 17,152 SQUARE-FOOT PARCEL OF LAND INTO TWO (2) PARCELS (LOM 548-P).

WHEREAS, a request was received from John Dugas, the property owner, for Planning Commission review and consideration of a proposal to subdivide a 17,152 square-foot parcel of land into two (2) parcels. The property is located in a *Medium Density Residential (MDR)* Zoning District at 521 South I Street (Assessor Parcel Numbers: 91-203-22) and;

WHEREAS, the request was considered by the Planning Commission at a duly-noticed

whereas, at the meeting of July 11, 2005, _____, was present and answered Planning Commissioners' questions and addressed their concerns; and whereas, at the meeting of July 11, 2005, _____ spoke in favor of, and ____ spoke in opposition to, the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PLANNING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LOMPOC RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: After hearing testimony, considering the evidence presented, and due deliberation of the matters presented, the Planning Commission finds that:

- A. The General Plan designation for the site is *Medium Density Residential*-which is consistent with the *Medium Density Residential (R-2)* zoning, and the staff analysis provides a basis for the recommendation; therefore, it can be found that the proposed Tentative Parcel Map is consistent with the applicable General Plan designation and policies.
- B. The proposed Tentative Parcel Map creates lots that are of reasonable size to support residential development; therefore, it can be found that the subdivided land is physically suitable for the type and density of residential development.
- C. The proposed Tentative Parcel Map is in general compliance with the City's policies and ordinances, as conditioned; therefore, it can be found that the proposed Tentative Parcel Map is not likely to cause environmental damage or substantially and unavoidable injure fish or wildlife or their habitat or cause serious public health problems.

- **SECTION 2**. Pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21089 and Section 15074 of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines, the Initial Environmental Study and Negative Declaration which have been prepared for the proposal show no substantial evidence that the project may have a significant effect on the environment, and therefore it can be found that:
 - D. The proposed Tentative Parcel Map, as conditioned, does not have a significant effect on the environment; and
 - E. Any effect of the proposed project upon fish and wildlife is de minimis and therefore no filing fee is required pursuant to the Fish and Game Code Section 711.4.
- **SECTION 3:** Based upon the foregoing, LOM 548-P is approved as proposed on July 11, 2005, subject to the conditions attached as Exhibit A which are incorporated by reference as if fully set forth herein.

DRAFT CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL LOM 548-P – TENTATIVE PARCEL MAP 521 SOUTH I STREET - APN: 91-203-22

The following Conditions of Approval are presented to the applicant in DRAFT form only and are subject to change during the Development Review Process.

I. PLANNING

Planning - General Conditions

- P1. All applicable provisions of the Lompoc City Code are made a part of these conditions of approval in their entirety, as if fully contained herein.
- P2. In conformity with Sections 8900, 8935, and 8936 of the Lompoc City Zoning Ordinance, the violation of any condition listed herein shall constitute a nuisance and a violation of the Lompoc City Zoning Ordinance and the Lompoc City Code. In conformity with Section 0107 of the Lompoc City Code, a violation of the Lompoc City Code and the Lompoc City Zoning Ordinance is a misdemeanor and shall be punishable as provided by law. In addition to criminal penalties, the City may seek injunctive relief. The applicant agrees to pay for all attorney's fees and costs, including, but not limited to, staff time incurred by the City in obtaining injunctive relief against the applicant as a result of a failure of the applicant to fully perform and adhere to all of the Conditions of Approval.
- P3. Owner agrees to and shall indemnify, defend, protect, and hold harmless City, its officers, employees, agents and representatives, from and against any and all claims, losses, proceedings, damages, causes of action, liabilities, costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, arising from or in connection with, or caused by (i) any act, omission or negligence of Owner, or their respective contractors, licensees, invitees, agents, sublessees, servants or employees, wherever on or adjacent to the Property the same may occur; (ii) any use of the Property, or any accident, injury, death or damage to any person or property occurring in, or on or about the Property, or any part thereof, or from the conduct of Owner's business or from any activity, work or thing done, permitted or suffered by Owner or its sublessees, contractors, employees, or invitees, in or about the Property, other than to the extent arising as a result of City's sole active negligence or to the extent of any willful misconduct of the City; and (iii) any default in the performance of any obligations of Owner's part to be performed under the terms of this Agreement, or arising from any negligence of Owner, or any such claim or any action or proceeding brought thereon; and in case any action or proceedings be brought against the City, its officers, employees, agents and representatives, by reason of any such claim, Owner, upon notice from City, shall defend the same at its expense by counsel reasonably satisfactory to City.

Owner further agrees to and shall indemnify, defend, protect, and hold harmless

the City, its officers, employees, agents and representatives, from and against any and all actions brought by any third party to challenge the Project or its approval by the City, including environmental determinations. Such indemnification shall include any costs and expenses incurred by Agency and City in such action(s), including reasonable attorney's fees.

- P4. Planning Commission approval of LOM 548-P is valid for twenty-four (24) months, prior to the expiration of the Map the applicant may request a twelve (12) month extension. LOM 548-P shall expire on July 11, 2007 unless the applicant requests a time extension as outlined by City standards.
- P5. The conditions hereby imposed are in addition to the conditions imposed by Conditional Use Permit CUP 04-06. In the case of any conflicts, the conditions listed herein shall prevail.

In conformance with Chapter 27, Section 2824 of the Lompoc City Code, the Parcel Map shall be prepared based upon the control monuments as established by the City of Lompoc Coordinate Control System by Record Of Survey filed August 22, 2003, in Book 172, Pages 4 through 7, Santa Barbara County Records. The Parcel Map shall indicate and identify the control monuments utilized in the preparation thereof. The Final Map shall be delivered in a computer format readily compatible for transfer to the City Geographic Information System at the time of map approval. The following computer formats are acceptable for delivery: DGN

(native Microstation); DWG (same as or less than Version 14); DXF.

EN4. Compliance with the Subdivision Map Act pertaining to monument security, Section 66496, is required if the interior monuments are not set at the time the Parcel Map is recorded. The Monument security shall be received and approved by the Engineering Division prior to final acceptance of the Parcel Map.

A cost estimate for setting the interior monuments shall be provided by the registered engineer or surveyor responsible for setting the monuments for determining the amount of the Monument Security.

The City will release the Monument Security after the Engineering Division has received the following: (reference Section 66497 of the Subdivision Map Act)

- 1. Written notice from the engineer or surveyor indicating that the final monuments have been set.
- 2. Evidence indicating payment has been made to the engineer or surveyor for setting the final monuments.

 - 5. Proof "TAX BOND" has been posted with County of Santa Barbara.
 - 6. Parcel Map delivered in a computer format readily compatible for transfer to the City Geographic Information System.
